

Books to get you through lockdown!

- Shapeshifter/Unleashed series, by Ali Sparkes: An imaginative and modern take on what would happen if children were to develop supernatural powers. This series has 11 books in total, but each book is fairly short. There is excellent character development throughout the books.
- **Skulduggery Pleasant, by Derek Landy:** As of now containing 13 books, Skulduggery Pleasant is a unique, witty read which takes you on a journey like no other. The plots and twists are incredibly well done and all of the characters have great depth and are believable, making you care about them.
- School for Good and Evil, by Soman Chainani: A slightly shorter series of 6 books, the School
 for Good and Evil takes every fairy-tale cliché and twists it, pushing the boundaries and
 changing the meaning of good and evil. This series is full of great, complex and intriguing
 characters with a brilliant plot. Each book feels packed with action, and the amount off
 development you get within just one book is astounding.
- The Windsinger Trilogy, by William Nicholson: This trilogy is completely different to any other books I have ever read. You follow three main characters on a journey as they discover themselves amidst a world of cruelty. The storytelling is amazing and excellently paced and by the end of the trilogy all of the characters have grown and developed so much.
- The Dark is Rising series, by Susan Cooper: This series has five books and follows two main plotlines, which all come together at the end. It is written so cleverly and the climax is immensely satisfying.
- The Wizard of Earthsea by Ursula LeGuin: This series spans an incredibly long time period, and you get to see all of the characters grow up and mature. The storyline is brilliant and the way the books are told is very clever.
- The Hobbit by J.R.R. Tolkien: This magical adventure story drives a powerful connection with the supernatural, and brings a brand-new view on classic fairy tales. The characters in the story evolve and develop throughout the adventures they have together, and empower a sense of achieving the impossible, no matter who you are. The Hobbit is the first book in the series, "The Lord of the Rings," and the witty language and plot keep the story alive throughout the several books in the tale.
- The House with Chicken Legs by Sophie Anderson: The House with Chicken Legs is a spellbinding story, that reflects many cultural and traditional customs in a mystical setting. The protagonist, Marinka, has to discover herself and her true place in the world, before she can gain independence and confidence in who she is. She develops so much as a character and delivers a powerful message, in a book that is unlike anything else you will ever read.

- My Brothers Name is Jessica by John Boyne: This incredible book tells the story of transgenderism, and the powerful language and message delivered makes it an all-time must read. The characters develop so much throughout the book, this story can truly change your opinion on the world. In a realistic setting, this transformative and spellbinding read reflects the prejudice and judgement of the modern day, and how family bonds and how even the people you care for the most may seem like enemies. This incredible book inspires so many to be themselves and to be proud of who they are.
- Frozen in Time by Ali Sparks: Frozen in time is an imaginative story, based on what life would be like if scientific discoveries achieved the impossible and found a way to preserve humans and freeze their hearts, only to be set back in motion. The hilarious and upsetting outcome of this story in a modern-day setting makes this a fantastic and touching story.
- Harry Potter by J.K. Rowling: The Harry Potter series is comprised of 7 incredible books, and are almost impossible to put down once you have begun reading. Opening the doors to a whole new world, Harry Potter and his fellow aspiring wizards are thrust into a world of mystery and magic at Hogwarts school of witchcraft and wizardry. These amazing stories are one of the most well-known series in modern literature, and are not only filled with adventure and action, but the many books make you care about the characters and want to be a part of the extraordinary wizarding world.

Bringing in wasps, bees, flies and lots of stuff


You are always scared of the newcomer
