After Newlands I completed a 2 years BTEC course at Langley College studying Health and Social Care Level 3 after not doing very well academically in 6th form I found my passion and right learning style in the BTEC approach mixed with work experience which meant I was able to excel in my course.

This course provided me with the basics on my social work knowledge and gave me a path way into work experience which I continued as a voluntary role in a drugs and alcohol service supporting adults with addiction. Whilst volunteering and studying I was offered a full-time job there so I decided to apply for university but defer my course for a year and within that time I worked full time for around 8 months in the service before going travelling in a converted van around Europe for a few months.

In September 2015 I started my Social Work Degree at The University of Winchester where I realised how much I had struggled academically throughout my whole education and was able to reflect on my learning style and challenges I faced which had massively impacted my selfesteem and attitude to learning as a child.

Despite the challenges I was able to complete my degree with completing two amazing work placements and qualifying in 2018 with an Upper Class Honours (2:1). I was blessed to get a Social Work job in the same local authority as I did my placement in and have had remained working in front line Children Services doing a few different roles over the past 6 years.

I'm currently working in a 16+ leaving care team and absolutely love it!

My time at Newlands ended abruptly as Covid-19 hit in March 2020, during my final year. Having really enjoyed studying economics at A-Level, I decided to pursue it further as a degree. However, I found myself struggling to connect with my degree, especially with all the disruptions caused by the pandemic. I was also uncertain about my future career path in traditional fields like accounting or finance, leading me to question whether my degree aligned with my interests.

In my final year, we had the freedom to choose modules and a dissertation topic that interested us. I found the sustainability and environmental modules refreshing compared to the algebra and theory that I was used to. I also took several courses focused on sustainability offered by my university, and got involved in eco-friendly initiatives on campus. These experiences reignited my passion for the environment, which had started during my time at Newlands. Reflecting on my involvement in the school strikes for climate marches and delivering assemblies on climate change as a geography prefect, I realized my passion for sustainability had resurfaced, prompting a huge career pivot in my final year.

When exploring post-uni options, I stumbled upon an internship opportunity at PwC in their sustainability division. Although I knew PwC as a prestigious financial services firm, I was unaware of their sustainability division, or that careers in this field even existed. After being accepted, I spent my graduation summer working in central London on a number of impactful environmental projects. This experience boosted my confidence, reignited my spark and led to a full-time position in the Sustainability Reporting division at PwC.

One of my proudest achievements has been developing an AI tool to analyse clients' sustainability reports, to ensure that global companies are being transparent about their environmental footprint, and offering solutions to transition their ways of working toward a greener future. Collaborating with colleagues globally, I'm continually inspired by the collective effort to drive positive change and I look forward to what my future has in store.

After completing my A-Levels I went straight into a filmmaking degree at Kingston University. Whilst there I was lucky enough to complete an internship with the BFI Southbank as well as doing occasional work on advertising shoots. Throughout University I worked on my craft and understanding of the industry, resulting in a film I directed being screened at the Genesis Cinema in East London. Following Graduation, I took a year to myself to create my own work and explore further where I wanted my career to go.

During this time, I attended a number of educational and training days relating to the industry, including Sky Studios and Channel 4. I was also lucky enough to get unpaid experience on the films Paddington 2 and Rocketman.

I got my first real break in the industry by approaching a shoot here in Maidenhead a year ago, where they took me on as a member of the locations department and since then it has snowballed. I have since been continuously working on a string of different high budget productions, travelling to many different areas of the country and working with some of the best in the Film and Television Industry. By getting the on-set experience I was then able to make the relevant contacts and have achieved a place within the Industry's most respected recruitment company, which has allowed me to start the move over to the assistant director's department, where I have had the opportunity to work with a handful of household name actors and where I hope to work my way up.

It has not been a quick or easy process getting to where I am, and I am only at the beginning of my career. Working within the Film and TV industry is not for the faint hearted, and is definitely not for everyone, but despite the long, unsociable hours and high workloads and pressure, I love my job and wouldn't change it for the world.

CONSERVATION WILDLIFE PHOTOGRAPHER

When I was initially thinking about what subject to study at university I was torn between my head and my heart. My head told me to study business studies, my heart, however, wanted to do art. It had always been my favourite subject and whilst some thought I was crazy to do so, I went with my heart and studied Fine Art for both my undergraduate and postgraduate at University of Kent.

However, after I finished my postgraduate, I struggled to get a job in my field. At the time, I was working two jobs, one as a freelance art tutor and another for Waitrose, who both offered me a sabbatical to travel for 9 months. I began this by volunteering with African Impact on their conservation wildlife photography project, as I had loved travel photography for a long time and was keen to learn more about wildlife photography.

Little did I know it at the time, but this would be a life-changing decision. About 8 months after I left the project, the photography manager got in touch and asked if I would like to come back as the photography project assistant for a year. It was a risk as the position was unpaid but I readily accepted.

The opportunity to live in, and teach something I loved in Africa was irresistible. 18 months on since I made the move, I am still here and have since been promoted twice, to Photography Coordinator and to my current position as Second Photographer, running a 4 week conservation wildlife photography project.

Whilst if you had asked me 5 years ago where I would be today, teaching photography in Africa would be one of the last things I would have said, but I am loving every minute and couldn't imagine doing anything else!

As part of the university course, I was required to undertake a one- year placement and after my second year at university, I secured a position in BMW's Marketing team. I initially made the transition from University to the working world by undertaking a Remote Sensing internship at Aerospace and Engineering consultancy Telespazio.

Throughout this internship I was shown different aspects of the business from the technical side through to sales and HR. This gave me perspective on what route I would like to follow for my career.


