In the last year, 'self-generated' child sexual abuse imagery has increased by 77% and represents a third of all child sexual abuse material identified and removed from the internet. These included images of girls aged 11 to 13, whose abuse had been recorded via a webcam in a domestic setting.

To help prevent the creation of this type of abusive imagery, a campaign has been launched by the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF), backed by the Home Office and Microsoft. It aims to help raise awareness of this type of criminality among parents and carers of young teens. The campaign wants to empower and educate girls aged 11 to 13 and over to spot the techniques used by sexual predators and give them the knowledge to 'Block, Report, Tell' someone they trust.

As part of the campaign, parents are encouraged to **T.A.L.K** to their children about the dangers.

- Talk to your child about online sexual abuse. Start the conversation and listen to their concerns.
- Agree ground rules about the way you use technology as a family.
- Learn about the platforms and apps your child loves. Take an interest in their online life.
- Know how to use tools, apps and settings that can help to keep your child safe online.

Is stress always bad?

Sweaty palms, racing heartbeat and stomach pains are all classic stress responses in high-pressure circumstances. A study by psychologists at the University of Rochester in New York found that reevaluating how one perceives stress could make a big difference to a person's mental health, general wellbeing and success.

Reframing the stress response as a tool, rather than an



obstacle, not only reduced student's anxiety, but the 'good stress' mindset reset also helped them achieve a higher score in tests.
