Year 9 pupils will also complete a formal Year 9 exam in the Summer Term during their English lessons. This is a reading assessment using an unseen extract.

Homework and Independent Learning:

The class teacher will issue this each week in line with their homework timetable. Pupils are to check their planners and/or Teams for their tasks and deadlines. This will be directed by their teacher. If your child would like to engage in further reading or independent learning, they could consider:

- The 'Independent Learning' booklet made available on their English Teams page
- Reading literature related to the topics they are studying in class

Independent Reading:

Reading allows all of us to build our vocabulary, improve our understanding and strengthen our lateral thinking skills (which is important for all subjects!) Recommended Reading Lists can be found in the Library section of the school website. As a school, we encourage pupils to engage with a wide range of literature and to experience and enjoy the wonders of reading. It is a pleasure to see how many members of the student body have a passion for reading.

We recommend that all pupils:

- Read for at least 30-60 minutes per week
- Listen to audiobooks
- For Year 9 pupils particularly, we also recommend that they engage with reading newspapers and online broadsheet articles

Reading content for a Year 7 pupil can be vastly different to that of our Year 11 pupils. There are so many texts available to pupils and with the popularity of books being reviewed on social media (including TikTok and Instagram) your child is able to access a wealth of information on different books. We want to continue nurturing and creating more independent readers in our school but we do ask that, when buying books, you check whether they are age-appropriate.

It is a pleasure to see how many members of the student body have a passion for reading. However, not all books are appropriate for their age group even if an older sibling has read it recently. In particular we are seeing a huge uptake in the reading of novels by authors such as Chloe Walsh, Colleen Hoover and the novel *Icebreaker* by Hannah Grace. Many novels, such as these, are widely published and often seen being advertised on TikTok. However, they are not always appropriate for KS3 pupils.

With this in mind we encourage parents to take an interest in what your child may be reading and to look online at the content if you are unsure or ask in your local library.
