

During lockdown, there's one thing we can all admit: we have all been using the internet A LOT! Let's be honest, what would we do without WiFi!? The internet is so useful in many different ways: we can communicate with people from around the world, talk to our friends and we even use it for our online classes! Despite the internet being so helpful, there are some more serious consequences beyond this online success; one of which includes cyberbullying.

Cyberbullying is the continuous action of hurting an individual virtually (online). This includes sending nasty comments to someone through the internet and sometimes even death threats. This can go on for a very long period of time and mentally impacts the victim (person being bullied/targeted) to think badly about themselves, losing confidence and sometimes can even lead to depression. Even though the person is not physically being hurt, Cyberbullying is just as hurtful and more dangerous, seeing as many people do not know the bully in real life. This means that they can completely change who they are virtually (e.g. lying about their age, looks, location, sending photos claiming to be of them). The majority of cyberbullying happens on social media. Social media is a platform where you can create and share content with others and exchange information. ALWAYS ASK AN ADULT YOU TRUST BEFORE GETTING SOCIAL MEDIA! Unfortunately, if the answer is no, than the answer is no. Our trusted adults know us best and we must respect that by listening to their opinions about social media. Social media is a big controversy (a big discussion or public disagreement) in society.

BE SMART! If you come across anything you are not sure about on social media, do not ignore it! Social media is more than gaining a fanbase and posting and liking pictures/videos. It is also about

keeping you safe. ALWAYS talk to a trusted adult, to help you, never keep it in!

BE SENSIBLE! DO NOT SHARE ANY PERSONAL INFORMATION. This includes age, where you live, what school you go to, etc. You need to be very sensible in your words online because, one you post it, it is posted. DO NOT POST ANYTHING THAT YOU THINK COULD OFFEND SOMEBODY. ALWAYS get a trusted adult's permission before saying anything about yourself online. It is also important to keep the people around you safe too! IF SOMEBODY YOU KNOW IS MISBEHAVING ONLINE, TELL SOMEONE YOU TRUST.

HAVE FUN! As long as you keep your personal information safe, be alert and tell an adult you trust if something happens that you are unsure about!

Harry Potter Book Review

There are a few plot holes, characters occasionally seem to have odd biases which don't appear to fit with their motives and the book is told nearly entirely through Harry's eyes, meaning we don't often get to see what the other characters think. This being said, overall the books are brilliant and definitely worth reading and I think their popularity is due to their amazing plot, complex characters, relatable themes and most importantly: an amazing world.

Harry Potter Film Review

The *Harry Potter* films were just as successful as the books, if not more so (I say this because there are a lot of people who have seen the films but haven't read the books). It can be very hard to do a film adaptation of any book, let alone an entire series of a long and beloved franchise. However, these films were obviously very successful, so why did they work?

Each film definitely had various problems, whether it be weird characterisation, bad acting or choosing to cut various parts of the books for no discernible reason. Despite this, I would say that each film, (mostly) managed to represent the books very well whilst effectively trimming down the longer books into more normal length films. From looking at various behind the scenes clips it is clear that a lot of love went into creating these films, especially the set pieces and special effects that were involved in bringing the wizarding world to life. This definitely showed, as their depiction of Hogwarts, the ministry, the burrow and the wizarding world in general was, in my opinion, very good. Quidditch was also handled very well and as the films progressed the acting got a lot better, resulting in some truly amazing performances.

For me, when re-watching these films I only have one main issue. That issue is the characterisation of Ron. It is important to note that when the first film came out only four books in the series had been published, meaning the people making the films didn't know how it was going to end. This isn't a problem until you realise that in making the film the writers would have to cut out and change certain things meaning that the writers could very easily brush over or change a seemingly meaningless aspect of the book which would actually be important later on.

This resulted in a few mistakes, but the main and most obvious one is the mis-characterisation of Ron. In the first few films, Ron is clearly the worst of the three main characters. He's the wimpiest, the most annoying and is really just there for comic relief most of the time. On top of that, he just doesn't have as many lines and isn't given as much attention as Harry and Hermione. The filmmakers chose to focus on Harry and Hermione's relationship and character development and neglected Ron. This meant that when Ron suddenly became much more important in the final book, and got together with Hermione, it almost felt out of the blue, which it definitely didn't in the books.

In summary, I think the films for the most part do an excellent job of staying faithful to the books as much as possible and they were clearly made with a lot of love, but certain choices and circumstances led to there being a few instances of mistakes and mis-characterisations that are easily spotted if you look for them.
