Book of the Month – December 2021 Romeo and Juliet A play by William Shakespeare

Book of the Month - November 2020 *Life of Pi* By Yann Martel

What is the book about?

A 16-year-old Indian boy's passage to a new life in America on board a freighter ends in a shipwreck in the Pacific. He is left to fend for himself on a life raft with an orangutan, a zebra, a hyena, and a Bengal tiger. Early in the book, Pi describes the behaviour of the zoo animals, and the story goes on to include acts of murder and cannibalism. Pi, whose real name is Piscine (the French word for swimming pool), is teased by other children.

Why have I chosen this book?

Life of Pi is a fascinating and original story of survival and identity. Martel creates a wonderfully realized, clever character in Pi, and a unique world of home, zoo, school and the houses of various gods. The bit where all three religious figures realize that Pi has joined their faith is quite funny, and so wise.

Why is this book so fascinating?

In Life of Pi, the author, Yann Martel, depicts a beautiful story of what a person must do when exposed to their imminent fate. Pi, a young Indian boy trapped on a lifeboat at sea with the most dangerous animals, must learn to survive under the given circumstances. This involves manipulating his beliefs, creating security from the animals and establishing dominance over them. Piscine has no choice but to sacrifice the principles he lives by in order to stay alive. A fantastic read!
