On Monday 20th June, it was World Refugee Day: it celebrates the strength and courage of people who have had to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution. Refugees leaving their countries often have to take long journeys by car, boat or even on foot to get to safety. These journeys can be dangerous, and some people don't even make it to their final destination, they often can struggle to find food, water and shelter. They mostly gather in places called refugee camps, which are giant camps with thousands of people living there, often in poor conditions. The UK and international charities have set up camps where migrants and refugees can get help in different ways, from food and shelter, to education for young refugees. Many countries have offered food, money and help to those countries that are at war.



Tragedy in the Amazon

On Saturday, Brazilian police confirmed that human remains discovered in the Amazon rainforest were those of a British journalist, Dom Phillips, who disappeared on the 5th of June with indigenous expert Bruno Pereira. Earlier this week police recovered human remains from a grave in the remote jungle after being led to the area by a fisherman, who had earlier confessed to killing the two men. Two of the five suspects are brothers Oseney and Amaraildo da Costa de Oliverira. Brazilian detectives are still believed to be interrogating three others, at least one of whom is suspected to have been involved in the murders. Police have not yet disclosed a motive for the murders, but it is thought that Mr Phillips and Mr Perieira were targeted because of their work defending the rights of indigenous peoples in the Amazon. whose lands and livelihoods are increasingly at risk from illegal mining and logging operations. While finally the saga of these missing journalists has ended, and thankfully they can be given a proper farewell, this is a tragic discovery and we will have these journalists and their families in our thoughts over the coming days. The fight for indigenous rights is ongoing: the work of these men is so important and, as a society, we should all educate ourselves on the importance of respecting indigenous lifestyles and rights.


