Poetry and the Human Condition

'Poetry in Motion' was the *Thought for the Week*, and our thanks go to Mr Kerrigan who delivered an inspitational assembly on Thursday, exploring the human condition through poetry. The human condition is defined as "all of the characteristics and key events that compose the essentials of human existence, including birth, growth, emotion, aspiration, conflict, and mortality".

Given the current situation in Ukraine, we wanted to take the opportunity to share this poem, written by Simon Armitage, our poet laureate, about the invasion and the pain of displacement, as a mark of solidarity with those under fire. Resistance was written over a few days against a backdrop of harrowing television footage of Ukrainians fleeing bombardment and shooting.

Armitage describes the poem as a "refracted version of what is coming at us in obscene images through the news [...] but is also a form of resistence, I hope. There is not a lot I can do, sitting here. But writing it down, taking ownership of the terrible images, feels like a positive act."

Resistance

It's war again: a family carries its family out of a pranged house under a burning thatch.

The next scene smacks of archive newsreel: platforms and trains (never again, never again),

toddlers passed over heads and shoulders, lifetimes stowed in luggage racks.

It's war again: unmistakable smoke on the near horizon mistaken for thick fog. Fingers crossed.

An old blue tractor tows an armoured tank into no-man's land.

It's the ceasefire hour: godspeed the columns of winter coats and fur-lined hoods, the high-wire walk

over buckled bridges managing cases and bags, balancing west and east - godspeed.

It's war again: the woman in black gives sunflower seeds to the soldier, insists his marrow will nourish

the national flower. In dreams let bullets be birds, let cluster bombs burst into flocks.

False news is news with the pity edited out. It's war again:

an air-raid siren can't fully mute the cathedral bells let's call that hope.

But now that he has triggered the survival instinct of Europe and the broader West, the world is entering a dangerous new phase of existential conflict."

Library Reminder



Last week, our Geography Class went on a field trip to Leeson House in Dorset, where we spent three days doing hands-on fieldwork for both physical and human geography. We loved the beautiful scenery and great facilities, and the fact that we got to visit new places while getting key data, and learning new skills in gathering fieldwork.

The first day was spent visiting Boscombe, where we gathered valuable human data, including Bipolar surveys, which helped us gain deeper understanding on what gives a place its features and reputation. During this we got to explore the area including the beach, despite being in the pouring rain!

On the second day we visited Corfe Castle with our lovely guide from Leeson house. We got to explore the idyllic village of Corfe while collecting human data on the area, including local surveys. We even got to visit the traditional sweet shop, which was a hit for the class!

On the third day we went to Studland Bay, where we measured sand dune recession with a range of exciting and interesting data collection methods, such as soil pH equipment and quadrats, taught to us by our wonderful fieldwork staff member. After investigating the biodiversity of the dunes, the class enjoyed lunch on the beach and ice creams in the sun!

Another bonus was the table tennis, where Mrs Coombs and Mrs Turner battled out rounds with support from the class! Leeson house also offered a great cooked breakfast every morning, and even vegan options.

The amazing fieldwork staff taught us many methods of data collection and gave us access to websites and links which will greatly assist us in our NEAs. To top off the trip, we travelled sustainably by train, where we caught up with our classmates on the exciting few days.




