I have been experiencing gender dysphoria for years, but that concept had been completely foreign to me until recently. I felt suffocated in my own skin without realising the reason. I was fortunate enough to meet people that educated me. but many people do not. Feeling dysphoric and not knowing how to alleviate it can lead to so many detrimental mental health issues. We need to ensure trans youth understand themselves and feel safe enough to come out and ask for help."

### What about us? Zoha Qureshi, 13E

The war in Ukraine has been raging since February, wreaking havoc on the lives of men, women and children across the country. Crowds have been gathering and taking shelter in underground subways, after bombings of houses and vulnerable areas such as nurseries. But have we really learnt any lessons from situations elsewhere, or is Ukraine destined to face conflict for years to come?

Similar struggles have been unfolding **for decades** in Palestine, Yemen, Kashmir and other regions. Regular Palestinians have had their homes terrorized and invaded in Sheikh Jarrah. Yemen, one of the poorest countries in the middle East, has been targeted by the Saudi regime in its plan to expand its regional influence against Iran. This has dominated Yemen for

**centuries** and has caused an estimated 233,000 deaths, including 131,000 from indirect causes such as lack of food, health services and infrastructure.

I cannot help but wonder why these examples are so under-represented in the news, and why it seems the world remains silent and chooses not to intervene? What differentiates Ukraine from Yemen and Palestine? Is it unfair to suggest that it is perhaps because the latter are Muslim countries, where often any conflict is labelled extremism? Is it because Ukraine is considered more western, and geographically the war is on Europe's doorstep?

While I passionately hope that the war in Ukraine will be brought to an end as soon as possible, and grieve along with the rest of the world about the human loss and suffering, I also pray that these other conflicts do not continue either.

#### Purple Day

Purple Day is an international grassroots effort dedicated to increasing awareness about epilepsy worldwide. On March 26th annually, people in countries around the world are invited to wear purple and host events in support of epilepsy awareness. Purple day was created in 2008 by Cassidy Megan, a young girl from Canada, who has epilepsy and wanted to get people talking about the condition. Cassidy decided to use the colour purple because lavender is recognised as the international flower of epilepsy. Cassidy not only wanted to raise awareness but also assure people with epilepsy that they are not alone.

"I don't have epilepsy, but I have a condition called Functional Neurological Disorder (FND) which causes me to have seizures: sometimes these can be similar to an epileptic fit. Seeing these seizures can be scary for other people, unless they understand what is happening and what they should do to help. I think Purple Day is a brilliant opportunity to educate people about this."
